Volunteering Focus: The Dog Walking Project

Exeter University Students make one of the largest contributions of student volunteering time in the UK. Exeter Student Volunteers (ESV) are a student society that manage a range of long-term volunteering schemes and projects. In this article we wanted to highlight the work of The Dog Walking Project.

Exeter student Volunteer's Dog Walking project is a student-led volunteering programme that supports members of the Exeter community who need help caring for their dogs. Sometimes local people need help with dog walking because they have become unwell or are recovering from an operation and dog-walking can be a huge help.

Although the scheme has been running for a few years, it saw a major expansion last academic year, growing from eight dogs in September to now supporting twenty-two dogs, with around four hundred student volunteers and ninety walks taking place each week. Each week, project leaders send out walk schedules,

matching volunteers with dog owners and helping to build meaningful relationships between students and the wider community.

But it is not just about coordination, there is a real sense of community among the volunteers, who stay in touch through an active WhatsApp group, share updates and dog photos, and follow along on Instagram for regular highlights and interactive updates.



The project continues to grow because it offers something valuable to everyone involved: support for residents, companionship for the dogs, and a chance for students to make a difference while doing something enjoyable and rewarding.

Exeter Students Win National Sustainability Fund

The University Partnerships Programme is delighted to announce the winner of the Student Sustainability Fund – a pilot scheme launched at Exeter, Hull and Leeds Beckett universities.

An expert panel has chosen 'Stitch by Stitch', the sustainable fashion project led by students at the University of Exeter as the winner.

The Stitch by Stitch team set out to make Exeter's fashion ecosystem more circular and sustainable, through a series of activities. They held speaker events and workshops, taught students repair techniques, held clothes swapping events and boosted awareness around fast fashion and sustainable clothing.

Emily Pink, Co-President of the Stitch by Stitch project said: "From the conception of our project, Stitch by Stitch, we wanted to create something that outlasts our time as students here at Exeter. Reflecting on my final four years here at Exeter, I cannot think of a more rewarding end than winning the Student Sustainability Fund. I am so proud of the team for all they have accomplished. We have engaged thousands of students, forged new local partnerships, connected the university with the wider community, been recognised both locally and within the institution, and, crucially, instilled a passion for slow fashion in so many people."



Kay Cameron, UPP Foundation and Social Purpose Manager said: "The Student Sustainability Fund has been an amazing opportunity to work with our university partners across the country, to explore what sustainability means to our students. It has been fascinating to see the passion, the learning and the engagement that each one of these student teams has been through over the past year."



This event is aimed at new and returning students, as well as local permanent residents who want to make a positive difference. We will be exploring local sustainability challenges, and ways that we can tackle them by working collaboratively. We will be inviting local organisations such as Friends of Hoopern Valley, Exeter Seed Bank, and the Community Garden to join us.

This event is organised by the University of Exeter and Exeter Students' Guild with support from our Community Panel.

We hope that the 'Community Challenge' will become an annual event that will allow us to bring together new and returning students with local people, to explore an issue of joint interest.

If you have something that you would like us to try to repair, please contact us initially so we can confirm that we will have the appropriate repairer available. At present you can contact us on **repaircafe@exeter.ac.uk** and shortly we hope to have an online form available to gather information on items for repair and repairer's skills.

Establishing a repair shop on campus was instigated by University staff member Peter Rayment:

"I had read about the university being a leader in the promotion and education of Circular Economy worldwide and it seemed to me to be a fantastic opportunity to facilitate a grass roots development of a circular economy project that we could promote and practice at a local level. The repair of items (and their re-use) is one of the most fundamental ways to extend a product's life and reduce environmental impact."
